Temple Talk

For Us the Living By: Rabbi Tracy Nathan

In his speech given at the memorial service held at the University of Arizona following the shooting in Tucson that killed six people and injured U.S. Representative Gabrielle Giffords and 13 others, President Obama spoke of the inspiring lives of those who were killed and the heroic actions of ordinary citizens:

“Their actions, their selflessness poses a challenge to each of us. It raises a question of what, beyond prayers and expressions of concern, is required of us going forward. How can we honor the fallen? How can we be true to their memory?”

His words evoked President Lincoln’s Gettysburg Address:

“It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work, which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be dedicated to the great task remaining before us – that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave their last full

measure of devotion – that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain.....”

Though the news of this tragic event will soon pass in the media, I hope that we take the President’s words to heart and find ways - personally and nationally- to honor the fallen and “be true to their memory.”

The Rambam in the first chapter of Hilchot Ta’anit of his Mishneh Torah suggests that those who do not respond to tragedy with self and societal soul-searching act with cruelty. If a nation is unchanged after a national tragedy – then the tragedy remains senseless and meaningless. The Rambam saw tragedy as a vehicle for repair and transforming ourselves for the better.

Whatever caused the gunman to open fire on fellow human beings is complicated and should open up productive discussions on mental health approaches, gun

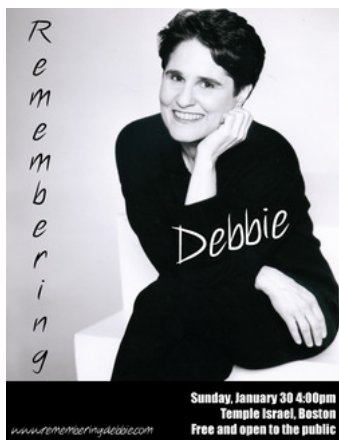

Marks Remarks: She Dances Toward the Light: Remembering Debbie Friedman

Debbie Friedman died at daybreak on Sunday, January 11. Debbie Friedman was a singer/song writer credited with introducing a contemporary style to American Jewish music that has spread from summer camps to synagogues of all denominations. Anyone growing up attending a Reform Synagogue in the 1970's and 80s knew of her. One tribute stated that "she probably has revolutionized Jewish liturgy in a way no other artist has since Shlomo Carlebach." She was the most well known and influential composer of Jewish music and liturgy in the United States. Another tribute called her "the Elvis of reform and conservative congregations."

The Jerusalem Post said that "Friedman's music is performed in synagogues around the world more than that of any other modern composer." Her most well known song is a setting of Mi Shebeirach, the prayer for healing. Her English lyrics are simple and authentic: "May the source of strength, who blessed the ones before us help us find the courage to make our lives a blessing, and let us say Amen. Bless those in need of healing with Refuah Shleimah, renewal of body, renewal of spirit, and let us say Amen." As evidence of its popularity and impact on American Jews across all denominations, these words are included in the Conservative movement's new machzor .

"Nobody changed Jewish liturgy in the last 200 years like Debbie Friedman did in the last 40," said one tribute. Debbie Friedman placed English words alongside the traditional Hebrew, and included feminine voices where they weren't previously heard. She referred to her song "L'chi Lach" a midrash on the Torah Portion

"Lech L'cha/ Go Forth.")

I first heard Debbie Friedman's music at Shabbat services at Hillel when I was in college, and saw her perform in concert at Brandeis and other places in the Boston area several times. Her concerts and her music filled the room with energy and spirit. Her lyrics and her melodies touched many lives.

Throughout the day, updates on the facebook and twitter social networks spread the word that the JCC in Manhattan would be broadcasting a live memorial service on the Internet that evening. Almost 3200 people from all over the world watched and listened to the memorial service from their computers, along with an in-person audience of over 400 people at the JCC. Two days later, over 7,000 people watched as her funeral was broadcast live from California on the Internet.

In chat rooms, facebook, and on twitter, the conversation flowed during both events as viewers identified themselves and their locations. I watched as former summer campers, rabbis, cantors, and friends rediscovered each other behind their online personae. As the leaders were singing the final line of Mi Shebeirach, "and let us say Amen", several online participants typed "Amen" in the chat window in unity with those attending the event in person. Many shared phrases from Debbie's songs that in this context, conveyed blessings on her memory. "May you be blessed as you go on your way," (a verse from her Tefilat HaDerech/Traveler's Prayer song), one person wrote. "She dances toward the light" (a verse from her song about Miriam the Prophetess), said another. People on the online chat room talked about organizing community memorials in their own towns. Rabbi David Paskin of Canton, MA announced the web site "rememberingdebbie.com" for sharing remembrances and announcing other memorial events.

Shawn Landres, a religious studies expert and community organizer in California posted on Twitter: “Anyone who doubts the power of online prayer should watch the recording and chat log” of Debbie Friedman’s memorial service live broadcast. Another viewer said “this is part of being part of the Jewish community.”

May she be blessed as she goes on her way.

accessibility and control, and other public discourse on a level, as President Obama said so eloquently, “worthy of those we have lost.”

But beyond this, the context of the shooting should not be lost. This was a scene of democracy at its best. In describing this scene – shattered by a gunman’s bullets – President Obama reminded us that it is not just those who die on the battlefield for whom we might take, in President Lincoln’s words, “increased devotion to that cause for which they gave their last full measure of devotion.”

Rep. Gabrielle Giffords is a member of the inaugural class of the Aspen-Rodel Fellowship for young leaders. Her classmates noted that on the first day, she remarked, “We don’t spend enough time talking to our neighbors; we need more front porches – more open conversation.” (“On the Front Porch with Gabby,” Huffington Post, January 14, 2011). She regretted the tone of public discourse in Congress and in the media because although democracy demands vigorous debate, the tone and lack of respect prevents parties from listening to one another and the possibility of being shaped by one another’s thoughtful opinions.

The people who came together for Rep. Giffords’ “Congress on Your Corner” were participating in that open dialogue and conversation necessary for democracy. Rep. Giffords and those gathered were listening to one another. It is for us the living to reflect upon their devoted actions and begin the work of repair and only then can true healing begin.
