Rabbi's Corner: I Am My Beloved's and My Beloved Is Mine

Dear Community,

I write this, my first temple bulletin piece as TBI's new rabbi, with gratitude, excitement, and hope. I have been on a long journey. From my Midwestern origins in Chicago and Madison, Wisconsin, I moved to Boston, to Jerusalem, and back again to Boston. Along the way, I worked and studied music, literature, Torah, Torah, and more Torah. In yeshiva in Jerusalem and at rabbinical school in Newton, I replanted my life in the wisdom and beauty of Jewish tradition while also keeping my heart and mind open to the needs of our time.

Now that Sara, Rafi, and I have moved to Waltham and my job has begun, I feel a deep sense of being home, of having landed. The Hebrew month of Elul is underway - the month before Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, before we are forgiven, before we start afresh, before our slate is wiped clean - and my mind returns to a teaching from the Talmud. "Elul," says the Talmud, is an acronym. The Hebrew spelling of "Elul" - Alef, Lamed, Vav, Lamed - stands for "Ani L'dodi V'dodi Li." In English, "I am my beloved's and my beloved is mine" (Song of Songs). This teaching means that Elul is a time for being in love with life/Torah/God again. When we are in love, all non-essentials fall away. What remains is what really matters. Elul is a time for letting the non-essentials fall away so that we can recommit to what really matters, to our vision of the future, to community and to living in productive harmony with all living things. That's real *teshuvah*.

I am grateful to all who love and care for Temple Beth Israel. You are an inspiration, and you teach us what this community is about. I love Shabbat at TBI, both Friday night and Saturday morning with their silk flowers, whitefish salad, lilting song and passionate Torah. I love weekday minyan, special observances, committee meetings (yes!) and one-on-ones. I love the gardens at TBI, the Sisterhood and the new ramp being installed outside, the cantors, my fellow employee Andrea Baron, Elvis the dog and the Krakauer piano in the corner of the Kiddush hall.

Mark's Remarks: : Welcoming the New Year – Jewels of Elul

As I write this, the Hebrew month of Elul is beginning in a few days, and that starts the clock ticking until Rosh Hashanah, a month away. In many Jewish communities the shofar is sounded each morning during Elul to remind us to use this time to consider our successes and shortcomings of the year that is about to end.

Craig Taubman, a contemporary Jewish singer and songwriter, publishes a website of short stories and anecdotes called Jewels of Elul (<http://www.jewelsofelul.com>). He shares a new "jewel" each day of the month. The diverse group of previous authors has included Barack Obama, Desmond Tutu, Ruth Messinger, and others. Last year, each essay was on the theme of welcoming others. Here is one such jewel from Herve Humler, President of the Ritz Carlton Hotel Company:

At Ritz-Carlton, every one of the ladies and gentlemen who work for us carry a wallet-sized credo card with them at all times. It states our three steps of service:

1. Extend a warm welcome.
2. Anticipate and fulfill stated and unstated needs.
3. Provide a fond farewell.



As you can see from number one, welcoming is our top priority. But, in fact, all three steps are about welcoming. Only if the totality of an experience is authentically meaningful can a person truly feel welcome.

What is true of a hotel is true of a home. How often are we all guilty of asking, "How are you?" without expecting or being interested in a real answer about the other person's successes or challenges, frustrations or fears. To truly welcome another requires truly caring about another.

This is why, above all, our success is due to the fact that our credo is not simply a collection of words. At every level, we are sincerely happy to see our guests when they arrive, appreciate the time they spend with us, and look forward to their return. It takes constant effort, but companies, too, can care.

Welcoming others is something we do each Shabbat, when we sing *Shalom Aleichem*, welcoming the angels of peace. This song follows the same structure as the Ritz-Carlton credo (or maybe, it's the other way around!) We sing: *Boachem I'shalom!* Come in peace! *Barchuni I'shalom!* Bless us with peace! *Tzeitchem I'shalom!* Take leave in peace!

You can subscribe on the Jewels of Elul website to receive a daily jewel by email. This year's theme is "The Art of Return." Take a few minutes each day to get in the spirit of the High Holy Days.
