### Rabbi's Corner: May Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head

The rabbis of the Talmud are fascinated by the different words the Torah uses for rain. In a verse often understood to be focused on God's judgment, the second paragraph of the Shema says, "If, then, you obey the commandments that I enjoin upon you this day, loving Hashem your God and serving Hashem with all your heart and soul, I will grant the rain for your land in season, the early rain [yoreh] and the late [malkosh]" (Deuteronomy 11:13-14). The rabbis of the Talmud say the early rain is called yoreh because it instructs [moreh] people to plaster their roofs and to bring their produce from the fields into their houses. Or it's called yoreh because it moistens [marve] the earth, or because it falls gently and not vehemently. The creative explanations keep coming. After a while, the Talmud explains the late rain, too. It is called

malkosh, they say, because "it circumcises [mal] the stubbornness [kashyuteihen] of the Jewish people," i.e., it penetrates to the heart of the Jewish people. Or it is called malkosh because it fills out [memaleh] produce in its stalks [bekasheha] (Taanit 6a).

Rain is so interesting to the rabbis because it is superimportant in the Torah. God makes it clear: since their land has no great rivers or lakes, the people of Israel depend completely on rain for its survival. The Fall holiday of Sukkot bears witness to the crucial importance of rain. Each of the four species in the *lulav* requires a great deal of water to grow. It's no coincidence that shaking lulav resembles a rain dance - that's what it is! In the first and second (Continued on page 4)

This is, after all, the context for everything the board considers, as a group and as individual contributors. So, our job is to be in an ongoing process of teshuvah. Yet I know that the work of the board seems distant to some. I want to write openly to you about what the board has been doing and the priorities we have been discussing. I also want to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to engage in open lines of communication with TBI's leadership.

#### Who is on the Board

For starters, it's important that you know who serves on your board. The board year began in July, and our current board includes people who have served in the past and others who have newly joined. There are five officers and three at-large members, seven of whom were elected by the synagogue membership at the annual meeting in June and one of whom was last re-elected in 2020. The chairs of our seven standing committees also serve on the board; these are roles appointed by the president. And the immediate past president is a board role. #### When the board meets

Most board meetings include a portion that is open for all TBI members to attend, and a portion in executive session that is reserved for the board to work on issues only among themselves. This is not to be secretive, but to ensure the time and focus to work on business. But ultimately, the work we do is on the congregation's behalf, and we will share our decisions openly.

In case you'd like to sit in on the open portion of any board meetings, here is the schedule for the 2021-2022 year:

Monday, August 2, 2021—this was entirely in executive session, as the board met for the first time and held a two-hour virtual "retreat" to develop our priorities and expectations for how we will work and communicate with each other

Monday, October 11, 2021—more of this meeting than usual will be in executive session, as we must deliberate and vote on the budget

Monday, December 6, 2021 Monday, February 7, 2022 Monday, April 4, 2022

All of these meetings are scheduled for 7 pm to 9 pm. For now, we are meeting only on Zoom. If you would like to attend a meeting, please feel free to reach out to me for the link.

In June, we will hold our annual Congregational meeting; we do not have a separate Board meeting scheduled for that month.

The committees will seek to hold their meetings in the months when we do not have board meetings scheduled. However, if there ever is an issue that requires an additional board meeting, we have committed to each other that we will make ourselves available for it.

While some agendas will differ (as noted above for the August and October meetings), we expect to follow this general format to our meetings:

#### How we work

At our August meeting, part of our discussion was about *how* we work. We talked about bringing ideas up first at the committee level where it most seems to fit—and then across the committees that might be involved. After that, if the committees have something to propose, it comes up to the board level. Throughout that process, however, the board members are available to each other for bouncing ideas—we're here to help each other think things through. But the committees do a great job of hashing out ideas so they are ready for official board consideration, and we want to make sure we never skip that important step.

We talked about being a web—that our work as board members often is most effectively done not individually, but together. Similarly, the committees work best when they look for where their proposed initiatives connect with the roles and interests of other committees and then reach out to each other, and compromise as needed in order to consider all the input, schedules and priorities involved.

We also recognized that we have limitations in the amount of time, energy and appropriate skills we have available to invest among the board members and all of TBI's volunteers. We want to make sure we bring value to the congregation in a way that we realistically can support, and that we have the flexibility to apply our combination of talents, time and energy most effectively.

#### What guides us

At the August meeting we also identified a number of overall priorities for the year. None of them is about the work of any one committee or project; instead, they should guide decisions, approaches and priorities for each of us, for the committees and for our budgeting process. These include:

Outreach/programming with appeal to the 15 to 25 age group and to the 25-45 age group Inreach to our members in personal, meaningful ways

Leveraging the strength of the ritual talent among our congregants

Weaving TBI and its space into the broader local community/organizations

As Rabbi David taught us, our connection to something larger than ourselves is one form of teshuvah. I hope that this article is one small aspect of the larger commitment to connect the work of the TBI board to the community. Let's keep the communication going. Everyone at TBI has ideas and perspective to add. We want to hear what's on your mind. As I mentioned above, you are welcome to attend the open portions of board meetings. ### Rabbi's Corner: May Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head

Jerusalem temples, water was poured on the altar during Sukkot, instead of the usual wine. The Mishnah teaches that the rainy season begins as soon as Sukkot ends.

But the people's reliance on God to bring rain that is a blessing (no one wants destructive flood rains) - is not just the message of Sukkot - it's part of the message of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, too. Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are days of judgment when we are taught to return to God, to reflect, mend our ways, and to seek forgiveness from those whom we've wronged. But why do we emphasize repentance in the Fall and not in the Spring? The answer is that we emphasize repentance in the Fall because that's the beginning of the rainy season in the land of Israel, which means that our chances of surviving this year are about to be written on the earth in raindrops. We tend to emphasize God's judgment of our individual lives, but both our prayers and the Torah emphasize our judgment as a community. The real book of life is the earth itself. Our names are written in it not in ink, but rather, in raindrops. To be written in the book of life means to receive rain as a community, as a region, and it means for our community's crops to grow, giving us food to eat. On Rosh Hashanah, we try to put our lives back together so that God will judge our community favorably, giving us rain, and, ultimately, food. On Yom Kippur, we intensify our prayers in the hope that we will arouse God's compassion so that God will bless us with rain.

In the song "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head," which Hal David and Burt Bacharach wrote for the 1969 film *Butch Cassidy* and the Sundance Kid, raindrops are associated with "the blues," with being unhappy. But ancient Jews would have been perplexed by this association, because, to them, rain was a sign of God's favor. Or maybe the "I" of the song would feel happier if he could see that the raindrops bring blessing. In the Babylonian Talmud Tractate Taanit 4a, the 4th century sage Rava teaches us to appreciate the benefits brought by different kinds of precipitation: "Snow brings benefits to the mountains; strong rain provides benefits to trees; light rain brings benefit to fruit; and drizzle is even beneficial to a seed under a clod of earth."

The Fall cycle of holy days, from Rosh Hashanah through the end of Sukkot (Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah), reminds us of the holy partnership between human communities, God, and climate. These holy days remind us to live in harmony with the climate, with the earth, with each other, and with God. In the new year 5782, may we see our local communities, our people, our nation, and the whole world achieve greater harmony with water and those to whom it flows.

May we also see an end to the coronavirus pandemic, speedily and in our days. Amen.

L'shanah tovah tikateivu - May we all be written in the book of life for a good year.

G'mar chatimah tovah - May we be sealed for a good year.

Chag Sameach - May we feel joy on our holy days.

May the rains come in their season, for blessing, and not for a curse.

### Mark's Remarks: Torah Covers in Memory of Al Simon

Shortly after Al Simon passed away in April, 2018, his family wanted to honor his memory with a lasting gift of Judaica to Temple Beth Israel.

Born in 1925, Al was the son of Carl and Mary Simon, who came to Waltham from Russia. The Simons, along with the Griffs, the Canters, the Gordons, and the Weiners, were founding families of Temple Beth Israel. He enjoyed attending Temple Beth Israel with his three first cousins Harris Griff, Evelyn Griff Forbes, and Ruth Simon Cormier.

Al attended cheyder and attended services at Temple Beth Israel in its early days, upstairs in the old building that used to stand at the same location as our current building. Going to shul on Saturdays at TBI was also a way for the Jewish children of Waltham to form a special bond. Many lived in the same neighborhood within walking distance of the synagogue, and AI would walk by their houses and pick them up as they made their way to the synagogue together.

Al married and moved to Newton and raised his four children there. He began attending Temple Emanuel where his children attended Hebrew school. However, Al kept his membership at TBI, where his parents had always belonged, and later he decided to come back to his roots, preferring a temple the size of TBI where he felt more at home.

After retiring, Al became a regular attendee at TBI's morning minyan. When he moved to Lasell Village, Al continued to attend services every Saturday morning at TBI until only a few weeks before he died.

If you look around the synagogue, you'll see the names of his parents, Carl and Mary Simon, in many places — on the silver yad used during Torah reading and on a Torah cover, both inscribed In Honor of Carl and Mary Simon's 50th anniversary; as well as on the sign above the door to the Chapel. His parents were involved in Temple Beth Israel their entire lives.

This Rosh Hashanah, we will continue the Simon family legacy, adding four white, High Holy Day Torah covers inscribed "In Loving Memory of Al Simon." These vestments display images of Trees of Life, Jerusalem, and a dove, all symbols of life and peace.

Our thanks to Jeffrey Simon, Doug Simon, Marc Simon, Lisa Simon and their families for their generosity in remembering Al.







### Our TBI Covid-19 Protocols for High Holidays and Every Day

#### **High Holiday Days**

To protect our congregants and our clergy, maintain a minyan in the sanctuary, and continue to provide High Holy Day honors as a treasured aspect of our experience, we will hold primarily online services as described below (See zoom links on the website and on pages 10-11 of this newsletter).

Only people who are fully vaccinated and masked will be allowed in the building for the holidays. Unfortunately we will not be making an exception for age or other factors related to obtaining a vaccination or wearing a mask. We also will limit those in the building to congregants who have been offered and accepted an honor in the service, along with member(s) of their families who meet the vaccination and masking requirements.

We very much want the youth in our community to have a High Holy Day experience. We will hold one Teen Meetup outdoors on Yom Kippur day at 2:00 pm. We will hold Family Services for younger children with their parents, outdoors on the first day of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur at 11:00 am. These are weather permitting.

#### **Every Day**

Middlesex County, MA--in which Waltham sits--continues to be at the level of Covid-19 infection for which the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends universal masking. We hold multi-access (in person and online) Shabbat morning services. We continue to require all people over the age of two--vaccinated and unvaccinated--to be masked when gathering together indoors at TBI and on the front porch.

We have suspended the sharing of snacks after Shabbat services, to avoid the situation in which people unmask to eat in our building. While we all have had much good intent to take our food outside, or even to distance while eating inside, it has proven too easy to slip back into our old habits of huddling close together. It is wonderful that we love to be with each other; when we are able, we will break bread together again.

#### Gathering at TBI requires:

All individuals above the age of two must remain masked when indoors at TBI, regardless of Covid-19 vaccination status.

If there are more than three people on the front porch, masking is required because the space puts people in close quarters.

No one may approach close to others without first knowing their comfort level with close proximity.

Thank you for being a part of our community, for participating in making it safe and welcoming for everyone, and for showing compassion to each other at this time when all of us wish we could do things differently.

### No Walk-ins Permitted For Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur


A very limited number of TBI members are permitted in our building for High Holy Day services, to maintain safety during the health crisis.



A recent donation to the TBI Library included a copy of Walking The Bible by award winning author Bruce Feiler. Early on the author admits that like many of his contemporaries, after leaving home he lost touch with his religious



roots, and viewed the Bible as a book gathering dust on a shelf. But as he traveled the world, old feelings from the past kept coming back to him. On a trip to Jerusalem he begins realize that the "story—so timeless, so abstract—might have happened in a place that was identifiable, no less one I could visit...a living breathing entity...an ongoing narrative." As this experience is repeated throughout his travels in the Middle East, Feiler decides to approach the Bible "with contemporary methods of learning—traveling, talking, experiencing." The result is part adventure, part archeological detection, and part spiritual quest, combined in one eloquent narrative.
