Rabbi's Corner

"The following message from Rabbi David was sent to the TBI community on Friday, May 27."

Dear TBI Community,

I am reaching out to you just before Shabbat to unite our community in sadness and resolve. Terrible things have happened in this country during the past two weeks, and I have been feeling heartsick, afraid, angry, numb. If you are experiencing some of these emotions as well, please know that you are not alone. Many tears are being shed.

Last week, a gunman motivated by racist hatred murdered ten people between the ages of 32 and 86, mostly African Americans, at a grocery store in Buffalo, NY. Today, we continue to learn details about another

massacre, this one at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, TX. The victims included nineteen children between the ages of 9 and 11, mostly Latinx.

Far from being isolated incidents, these massacres are part of patterns of domestic terrorism in our times. NPR reported this week that 27 school shootings have taken place in this country so far this year. Minorities and people of color continue to be targeted by racist hatred and conspiracy theories.

I have offered thoughts, and I will offer prayers. To do so is my rabbinic duty as well as a necessary expression of my soul. But thoughts and prayers are incomplete without action. We must not surrender to apathy and (Continued on page 4)

Fresh from the Bakery: Wilderness

As we enter June, we also enter into the book of Numbers, in Hebrew known as B'midbar—or "in the wilderness"—for its first word of significance.

Yet I associate the summer season in which we'll read B'midbar with nothing like the barrenness that comes to mind when I think of wilderness. Summer feels nourishing and colorful: full of warmth, of lush plant life, of fresh produce, of days hiking and kayaking, and of opportunities to be with family and friends whom I don't often get to see.

In our synagogue life, summer is between our big holidays (other than Shabbat, of course, which arrives without fail each week), service attendance sometimes creeps lower as people head out of town, and we have fewer meetings of the board and committees. Yet I see not the empty period that a wilderness might imply but rich

The Return of Kiddush

While it is a limited gathering—not the lunch we used to serve—it marks a renewal of a cherished ritual and time to socialize for the first time in more than two years.

hopelessness. These deaths are not merely the price of our freedom. As a Talmudic teaching says, "When the community is immersed in suffering, a person may not say: I will go to my home and I will eat and drink, and peace be upon you, my soul" (Taanit 11a). Such surrender is the opposite of a Jewish value. The value of preserving life (piku'ach nefesh) is and must be paramount as an expression of Jewish values.

Therefore, I urge us all to take political action. Call your representatives. Give money to a cause you care about. Take direct political action. Vote. Do something, in the name of God and in the name of the sanctity of human life.

Below, you will find the names and ages of the people who were murdered in Buffalo and in Uvalde. I urge you to say their names out loud.

May the memory of the slain inspire us to take action to protect and cherish the living.

May their families and friends, loved ones and neighbors, find comfort.

May cruelty and fear be uprooted from our hearts.

May we all find comfort.

May the One who makes peace in the heights make peace among us, too, among all the people Israel, and among all Earth's inhabitants.

I will miss Lillian and I am so glad that she lived to enjoy 103 years.



A Mountain of Blintzes

Early this month we'll be celebrating Shavuot, the Festival of Weeks. We are remembering the Spring harvest and receiving the Torah on Mount Sinai. Our library has two delightful children's books to help with the celebration.

A Mountain of Blintzes by Barbara Diamond Golden, illustrated by Anik McGrory, tells the story of Max and Sarah, hard-working parents who never seem to have enough money. Moe, their oldest, is learning about Shavuot in Hebrew school, and reminds them that it's only weeks away. "Such an important holiday!" says Sarah. "What a mountain of blintzes I could make! If only there was a little extra to spare." The humorous story is loosely based on a traditional tale set in Chelm, the Polish town filled with foolish people. But don't worry, everything works out in the end!

The Art Lesson, by Alison and Wayne Marks and illustrated by Annie Wilkerson, is about a young girl who loves her weekly visits with her artist grandmother. It's also about imagination, and the passing on of a beautiful Eastern European tradition of making cut paper decorations to hang in the windows for the Shavuot holiday.

Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,200 per grave, which includes one year of membership (\$600).

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,600 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership (\$1,200).
