## Brought To You By Rabbi Ben: Cosmic Teshuva

Shalom!

I write today during my first week as rabbi of Temple Beth Israel. This morning we gathered on Zoom for a spirited morning minyan, which was my first service as rabbi here. The singing of multiple leaders and chanting of our prayers brightened my day, as did the chance for each person to speak and share about their day. Connecting to God and to one another gives us strength.

I am filled with joy and excitement to build on the strengths of this community: the feeling of home, the commitment to inclusion, and the joyful spirit of participation in so many ways that both sustains our tradition and each other.

One could say the holidays we celebrate this month are yearly reminders of what we can do – as individuals and as a community- when we come together. The rabbis teach that when Israel comes before God as “agudah achat,” or as “one bundle,” our sins are forgiven, and we gain a clean slate for the new year. It takes all of us to become us. It takes a community to achieve our potential as individuals and reach teshuvah, or return, to our best selves.

When we achieve our potential, it not only impacts us, but it also shapes the world around us. We know this when we see the impact of acts of kindness on ourselves and others. The other day after a busy evening

shopping, I noticed the care and smile of the staffperson at Hannaford's who bagged my groceries. This led me to extend a smile to the next person I saw, who happened to be someone Jewish who lives in the neighborhood. When we find it within us to do an act of hesed, or lovingkindness, for those around us, its impact multiplies such that the world becomes a better place.

That is the ultimate goal of these holidays: to become better people through teshuva and prayer so that we can make the world a better place through acts of tzedakah, or justice work. The kindnesses we extend to one another this season are meant to expand to the world as a whole. The month of Elul preceding Rosh Hashanah encourages us to focus inward on what we need to change about ourselves; Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur bring us to find forgiveness and reconciliation with those in our communities, and finally, Sukkot draws our attention to the world as a whole as our liturgy commemorates sacrifices offered on behalf of all 70 nations of the world and as we welcome in the people (and the elements!) of the outside world into our sukkot. When we support the Community Day Center, More Than Words, and Food Not Bombs, we embody the ultimately expansive meaning of the holidays.

I cannot wait to celebrate the holidays with each of you and to witness the light we bring to one another and to the wider world this season and beyond!

We warmly welcome you to attend holiday services in the sanctuary, whether you join us in person or by Zoom. For our in-person option, we will have these security practices for everyone:

- \* You must register in advance to attend services during the High Holy Days. We don't need to know which services you'll attend—only that you may be at TBI's building for at least one.
- \* Once you register, we will mail you a security pass that provides building access during the High Holy Day services. **You should bring it with you whenever you attend.**
- \* We will have a security detail posted outside the building. They will check your pass.
- \* If you forget your pass, they will ask us to check your name on our master list of those who are registered, before you can enter. To avoid confusion or delay, the best option is to bring your pass.

### How to register for your TBI High Holy Days security pass:

- \* The preferred way to register is through our [online registration form; Click Here](#) or you can find a link to it on the TBI website.
- \* If you cannot use the link, please call Andrea Baron at the TBI office at 781-894-5146. Please give her the names of all people in your group needing passes, and the mailing address to which she should send them.
- \* We will mail a pass for each person whose name you provide, and place each name on the master list, as we realize you may not all arrive at the same time. Please be sure to include only people who actually may attend.

### Deadlines:

- \* Please submit the form or call no later than September 8th to ensure we have enough time to mail your pass(es).
- \* If you submit the form or call between September 9th and 14th, we will attempt to mail the passes but there is an increased chance that they will arrive late.
- \* If you submit the form or call after September 14th, we will add your name to our master list to allow entry, but we will not be able to mail you a pass.
- \* **We cannot accept registrations to attend after September 22nd.**

Thank you for your participation in our efforts to provide a safe environment for us to gather as a community.

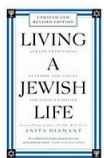

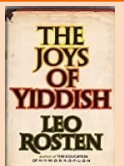

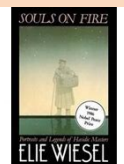


## TBI Bookshelf

# Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park



Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
