Brought To You By Rabbi Ben: Light Up the Night

I am excited to celebrate my first Hanukkah with all of you at TBI!

Hanukkah arrives at the darkest time in the solar year. We share with our non-Jewish neighbors the practice of adding light to our dark environment this season.

This light is meant to be more than practical.

According to Jewish law we do not use the lights of the menorah to light our path or read a book late at night (though those are important reasons to kindle light!). Instead, we light the menorah with the charge of *pirsumei denisa*, or to make known the miracle.

We light the menorah to remind us of the miracle God performed in extending the vial of oil to last 8 days and in securing freedom for our ancestors and their country against all odds. The menorah reminds us of

the light within and around us that can light up the darkest night.

We don't keep that light to ourselves. Instead, our tradition encourages us to place our menorah's outside our homes, or in our windows, to share our light with the world. This year, more than ever, is when we must proudly display our light.

Just as a candle makes a whole lot more difference in a dark room than a light one, so too do our Hanukkah candles make an even greater impact during these dark times.

May the lights we kindle bring hope to the families who lost loved ones on October 7 and to all impacted by the war in Gaza. May our lights represent the hope of peace and freedom in Israel, reminding us of what the



Lighting Hanukkah Candles

Hanukkah begins on the evening of Thursday, December 7th On the first night, recite all three blessings. On the remaining nights, recite only the first two blessings. On Shabbat, light Hanukkah candles before lighting Shabbat candles.

ברוך אתה ה', אלהינו מלך העולם,
אשר קדשנו במצוותיו, וצונו
להדליק נר של חנוכה.

Barukh atah Adonai Eloheinu melek ha-olam,
asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu
l'hadlik neir shel Hanukkah.

Praised are You Adonai our God, who rules the universe, instilling in us the holiness of mitzvot by commanding us to light the lights of Hanukkah.

ברוך אתה ה', אלהינו מלך העולם,
שעשה נסים לאבותינו,
בימים ההם ובזמן הזה.

Barukh atah Adonai Eloheinu melek ha-olam,
she-asah nisim la-avoteinu,

Praised are you Adonai our God, who rules the universe, accomplishing miracles for our ancestors from ancient days until our time.






Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
