Brought To You By Rabbi Ben: Renewal in the New Year

Happy (secular) New Year!

The new calendar year reflects the renewal we find around us in nature this time of year, which is expressed in Tu Beshvat, the Jewish New Year for trees we celebrate on January 24-25.

The rabbis in the Mishnah set Tu Beshvat (the 15th of the Hebrew month of Shevat) as the birthday for all trees, i.e. the date on which a tree turns one year older for purposes of taxation and use.

Why did they choose this date? After all, it is in the middle of winter, when trees even

in Israel lie dormant. Here are three reasons, which all speak to the theme of renewal:

The Talmud (Tractate Rosh Hashanah) suggests that by Tu Beshvat the soil in Israel has received enough rain during the winter rainy season to be a fertile planting ground for new trees.

Rashi notes that by Tu Beshvat the sap begins to rise to feed the new leaves and buds of trees.

In Israel the almond tree begins to bud around Tu Beshvat.

First Aliyah

You know the alef-bet and the vowels, and you can read the regular Shabbat prayers pretty well at this point. But you want to go further, maybe with the goal of chanting Haftarah or Torah. How can you build your Hebrew reading skill?



Developing Hebrew reading is like developing any other skill - you just need to do it repeatedly in varying situations.

That's what we'll work on in this class. We will look at the first aliyah of the upcoming Shabbat's Torah reading, and practice reading it. We'll work with a maximum of 5 verses. Scott will read it first, maybe more than once, and then participants will take turns reading, maybe word by word to start. This draws on the familiar management maxim – How do you eat an elephant? One bite at a time.

The goal: given 5 verses from the Torah (with vowels) and 2 hours to prepare, be able to read aloud at the rate of 1 word per second with 90% accuracy.

Class will meet online, Monday nights 6:30-7:15pm, beginning January 22. Scott will advise on appropriate online and printed texts. Contact Scott or Rabbi Ben for more information.

Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park


Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
