Happy Spring!

I write to you the day after our wonderful Purim celebration. Thank you to everyone who joined us for a joyous and spirited celebration- and a special shoutout to our megillah readers (especially those who read for the first time!), our post megillah songleaders, and of course to Mark for the wonderful annual slideshow and fun ma'ariv service!

We are now preparing for our next holiday of Passover! Passover is known as chag ha'aviv, the holiday of spring. On Passover we experience the renewal of springtime not only in nature around us, but also in the stories we live and relive each year.

On Passover we relive the liberation from bondage in Egypt with all our senses: we taste the bitterness and salty tears of slavery and feel the mortar-like charoset on our tongues. Yet we also taste the fresh greens of

spring and the matzah our ancestors baked on the way to freedom. We sing songs of joy and liberation in Hallel and we recline in our chairs feeling at ease sipping four cups of wine. We experience the renewal of our people eons ago as if it were tonight; we are on the precipice of something new and something great as we take our first steps as a people together.

We experience this renewal by telling our story. That story, as we know, is not yet finished. The Jewish people leave Egypt and will spend 40 years in the wilderness on the way to the promised land.

We, too, know how incomplete our people's freedom is even in the modern-day miracle of the state of Israel. As of this writing 130 remain held hostage in Gaza by Hamas. Israel continues to fight

Ta'anit Bekhorot: Fast of the First Born Siyyum Following Morning Minyan Monday Morning, April 22nd 7:30 am

On the night the first born of the Egyptians were slain, the first born of the Israelites were saved. To remember the loss of the life and in gratitude for salvation, firstborn children fast on the day preceding Pesach. The fast begins at dawn on Monday April 22nd and the common practice is to break the fast in the morning at a *seudat mitzvah* (a celebratory meal) following a *siyyum*, the celebration of the completion of study of a unit of Torah, Mishnah, or Talmud. The *siyyum* creates a joyful atmosphere that pushes aside the requirement to continue the fast.

The siyyum and chometz sale will take place immediately following morning minyan, Monday April 22nd. This year's siyyum is sponsored by Merrill and Carol Griff.

POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR MECHIRAT HAMETZ

Note: If possible, all hametz should be eaten or removed before the holiday begins. Should this be financially difficult, the hametz may be stored in such a way that we are sure not to use it during the holiday and its actual ownership is transferred to a non-Jew until the holiday ends. Please complete this form, which must be received in the mail no later than Friday April 19th, to make sure it gets to the Rabbi in time. You may deliver it to the Rabbi in person by 7:00 am, Monday, April 22nd.

I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Benjamin Chaidell to act in my behalf to sell all *hametz* possessed by me – knowingly or unknowingly – as defined by Torah and rabbinic law, and to lease all places wherein *hametz* owned may be found. Rabbi Benjamin Chaidell has the full power and authority to assign or appoint a substitute to act in my behalf with all the same powers and authority that I have invested in the rabbi. This transaction will be in effect for the duration of Pesach, which this year begins with sundown on Monday, April 22nd and runs through nightfall on Monday, April 29th, 2024.

a war for its security and survival. Israeli soldiers and their families pray every day for their loved ones to come home safe. Innocent people across the region are suffering from the loss of their homes, their health, and their loved ones.

Passover comes to remind us what renewal and potential feel like. Its story gives us a (literal) taste of freedom that inspires us that we too can achieve a measure of redemption with God's help. If our ancestors in servitude for hundreds of years to the world's most powerful empire could become free, so too can we when we take the first step and trust that more will come. According to the midrash, Nachshon ben Aminadav took the first steps into the Red Sea, and then God parted it.

Here at TBI we are looking forward to retelling and reliving this story of hope and freedom with you. Join us for our community seder on Tuesday night April 23; we are excited to hold a seder for the first time since before the pandemic, and we would love your help to make it happen! Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.

For this month, when we will celebrate Passover, I'd like to recommend a Gittel's Hands, a children's book by Erica Silverman, with illustrations by Deborah Norse Lattimore. This variation on the Rumpelstiltskin fairy tale is set in a tiny village at the foot of the Carpathian Mountains. Yakov the water carrier has a kind-hearted and talented daughter. Gittel bakes and sews and cooks and embroiders while she listens to her father, who loves to talk. One day, as everyone is preparing for Passover, Yakov laments that he cannot buy any more hay because he is already in debt to the hay merchant. When Gittel asks if they could pay the merchant in some other way, Yakov jumps up and says, "Child, come with me!" Yakov praises his daughter's skills, and the crafty merchant sets Gittel three tasks, but makes certain that she will fail each time by withholding needed materials. Gittel's kindness earns her the help of Elijah; despite her father's boastful words and the merchant's duplicity, all turns out for the best. The illustrations, in the style of famous painter Marc Chagall, are a wonderful complement to this tale.
