Brought To You By Rabbi Ben: Letting Go to Let In

Shalom!

When I was in school, I often tried to squeeze as many words and sentences into a paragraph as I could. I thought that was the way to show the teacher what I knew. It took my world history teacher to show me that an effective essay is clear and focused with each sentence contributing to the thesis at hand. Sometimes, I would have to edit out an interesting tidbit in order to make my point.

The same applies in the work we do. When I set (too many) goals for my first year as a rabbi, I received the helpful feedback: which of these goals will you let go of, for now? This enabled me to focus on how I could best serve the community.

The approaching High Holy Days provide us the space to consider our priorities for the year: what will we focus on, and what will we put aside. In order to renew ourselves in the new year, we sometimes must let go of some things in order to let in the new.

Today is the day after 17 Tammuz, the fast day that marks the date when the walls of Jerusalem fell. In a few weeks we will mark the destruction of both Temples on Tisha B'Av on August 12-13.

Rabbi Alan Lew writes that Tisha B'Av always falls exactly seven weeks before the new year of Rosh Hashanah. These fast days launch the return and renewal of the High Holy Days. How? In order to do the work of teshuva (return), we must face that which is (Continued on page 7)

Portraits: Scott Tepper

Diana Korzenik sat down recently to talk with Scott Tepper as part of her Portraits series. Scott is a very active member of TBI, leading services, chanting Torah and Haftorah, and even teaching Torah reading. He talked with Diana about his early Jewish experiences and how it informed the trajectory of his Jewish life.

Scott was born in Bridgeport, CT but his family moved around a bit, settling in Trumbull, a suburb of Bridgeport. His earliest Jewish experience was going with his grandfather to a tiny Orthodox synagogue. The Rabbi there was very imposing with his long white beard and a robe to match.

His parents had also helped to establish a synagogue in Bridgeport, but soon after they founded it, he and his family moved to St Louis, where Scott says his real Jewish experiences began.

One turning point for Scott was when he was about ten. In 1966, he attended an assembly at Hebrew School. They told him there would be something they had never seen before- a Rabbi who sang and played guitar. He saw a "roly poly elf" of a man, singing while the students danced. The spirit was infectious and drew him in. That man was Shlomo Carlebach.

After his bar mitzvah, Scott began to participate in services, learning how to lead and chant Torah, and taking on a variety of roles. He was influenced by many people along the way, but one cantor really took the time to help Scott and his cohorts learn how to lead was a man Scott called Cantor Leon. Cantor Leon off loaded many of his duties to Scott and the other young men and before long they had earned the respect of the congregation. Rabbi Leon was sure to remind them that when they were older, they would be able to "make a few bucks" leading High Holy Day services. Which is what Scott was doing when the war of 1973 broke out.

One thing that stuck with Scott from those early days was that while some clergy were more interested in becoming "rock stars", some, like Cantor Leon, felt it was more important to prepare the next generation of prayer leaders. Many of Scott's cohorts went on to become cantors, rabbis and Jewish educators. He only wishes that this model of learning went on in more synagogues today.

Scott came up to Boston to attend Brandeis and while he started out in pre-med, his love of Judaism pushed him towards Judaic studies, although not Rabbinical school. He was more interested in education than having a pulpit from which to preach. As part of his education, Scott spent a year in Israel, in a special program for Americans, taking all his classes in Hebrew. While there he even led a Passover Seder for IDF soldiers at a remote outpost.

Since moving to Boston for school, Scott has been involved in many local synagogues, even helping to establish a still functioning Havurah as well as the Newton Center (now Walnut Street) Minyan. He davens, teaches, reads Torah, and sings. In addition to his Jewish pursuits, Scott also works as a software trainer. As so often happens, Judaism, Technology AND music really do mix and mingle! Hopefully, in a sequel, we can explore Scott's love of The Grateful Dead and how he has explored Jewish themes in their music.

Temple Beth Israel is fortunate to have Scott now as a full-time member, able to fill in wherever he is needed and participate in lively discussions over kiddush lunch. We welcome Scott Tepper to our TBI community!!

Portraits: Ben Nudelman

Following a recent Shabbat Kiddush, in a cozy setting filled with nostalgic reflections and laughter, Diana Korzenik, as part of her *Member Portraits* series, interviewed Ben Nudelman about his life story: his *Yiddishkeit* upbringing in Brooklyn, New York, his education and career, how he met his wife Caroline, and finally, what brought him to the Boston area and *TBI*.

Ben spoke fondly of his formative years at *PS 238*, a public school in Brooklyn that was so Jewish that "they would have to combine classes [on Jewish holidays] because everybody was out." This overwhelming presence of Jewish culture in his school, as well as at *Camp Boiberik* for several summers, made him feel like he was part of a majority, instilling a sense of confidence and belonging from an early age.

The conversation shifted to family, where Ben shared poignant memories of his parents and their influence on his Jewish upbringing. He spoke about his father, a Yiddish writer and journalist who passed away when Ben was just eight years old, and how he played a significant role in his early education. "My father was always teaching me something," he recalls. Ben also spoke about his mother – who was 20+ years younger than his father - highlighting her resilience and survival amidst the horrors of the Holocaust.

Especially noteworthy, as the conversation continued: Ben met his wife Caroline in High school! They began as friends and continued as such throughout early adulthood until the relationship blossomed years later. By then, Caroline had moved to Boston, and Ben soon followed. They married in Boston, lived in Belmont for over ten years, pursued their careers and eventually moved to Waltham where they currently reside.

broken in our lives and in the world around us. We identify what we must let go of in order to make ourselves more whole. Or as our gardening team would suggest, we clear some plants whose time has passed to create the space for new ones to thrive.

Our mourning the Temples on Tisha B'Av reminds us that the loss of any part of ourselves is hard. Grief and sadness enter as we let go. We mourn the Temple even as we acknowledge that the Jewish life of today, the trifecta of Torah study, prayer, and acts of lovingkindness, would not have emerged if not for the loss of the Temple. The academy of Yavne grew only when the Temple in Jerusalem was gone.

Perhaps this is why the process of teshuva, or return, is hard. Because it involves not just learning new habits and adopting new behaviors, which is hard enough, but also the letting go of who we were, the annulling of promises we made last year at Kol Nidrei so that we can form new commitments in the new year. Like editing out a beloved sentence from an essay enables us to more effectively communicate, but can also be painful, so too does teshuva involve both loss of parts of ourselves in the process of learning to become someone new.

As we renew ourselves as individuals this holiday season, we will also have the opportunity to renew our community. At our upcoming board retreat and calendar meeting on August 4, we will plan programs for the year that will enable our community to grow and thrive. Our grassroots strategic planning this fall will enable us to set priorities for a sustainable future. I am excited to hear your ideas for programs and priorities to sustain our Temple in the months ahead!

Unlike the renewal of Judaism after the Temple, I certainly don't envision any Temple walls falling nor us letting go of any core part of who we are. But our planning in the next few months will, as personal teshuva does, enable our community to reflect on where we aspire to go and what will take us there. I am grateful to Linda and Dina for leading our calendar and strategic planning and to all who will be involved in charting our community's future.

I look forward to joining you for Shabbat Under the Stars on August 2 and to soon celebrating the new year with you all!

Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual

grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.
