Shalom!

This month we celebrate Purim, a rollicking, topsy turvy festival celebrated by reading the Scroll of Esther, enjoying meals and drink, and sharing gifts with neighbors (mishloach manot) and those in need (matanot la'evyonim).

Purim is a day that “shakes things up.” It is a festive early spring holiday reminiscent of Mardi Gras in its drunken revelry and costumes of kings and queens. We let loose social convention and try on a costume to show that life is not always as it appears. We read a topsy turvy story featuring Esther’s rise to the

throne, the Jewish people’s near-annihilation at the hands of Haman, and Esther and Mordechai’s victory in the palace as the Jewish people defeat their enemies.

The story carries us through a range of emotions, from celebration to sorrow to fear to exhilaration. While the Jewish people take the upper hand in the end, it comes at the cost of many lives and a traumatic near-death experience. The Jewish community of Persia undoubtedly felt immense relief and joy at their victory, but also quite unsettled.

It is at this time that Esther and Mordechai instruct the Jewish community to celebrate this victory by eating, drinking, and sending care packages of food and gifts to one another and to the poor. After a topsy turvy time, they take time to sit, eat, and be with one another, showing care and concern for neighbors of every means. This holiday encouraged our ancestors to pause and to find anchor with those around them. It enabled them to tell the story of how they came to be where they are, a trauma-informed practice to enable survivors of trauma to make sense of their experience. Purim was a way for our ancestors, and is a way for us, to find grounding with one another in a topsy turvy world. It is never more relevant than today.

This month join us at TBI for gatherings that enable us to find an anchor in the world. Find comfort in the melodies and Yiddishkeit Morris Hollender z"l taught us at our tisch on March 7, preceded by a hearty Shabbat dinner and spirited services. Our Purim celebration on March 13 will feature both festive fun and the grounding rituals of megillah, hamantashan, mishloach manot (care packages for neighbors), and matanot laevyonim (gifts to the poor). And our Jewish Studio Project workshop with Rabbi Valerie Cohen on March 30 will give us an opportunity to find an anchor through artistic expression. Of course, our weekly Shabbat services, monthly parsha class, and weekly Back to Basics ground ourselves in Jewish prayer and learning in our busy world.

I look forward to journeying with you in the ups and the downs of this month and beyond, finding grounding in our traditions, rituals and each other.

Chag Purim Sameach! Happy Purim!

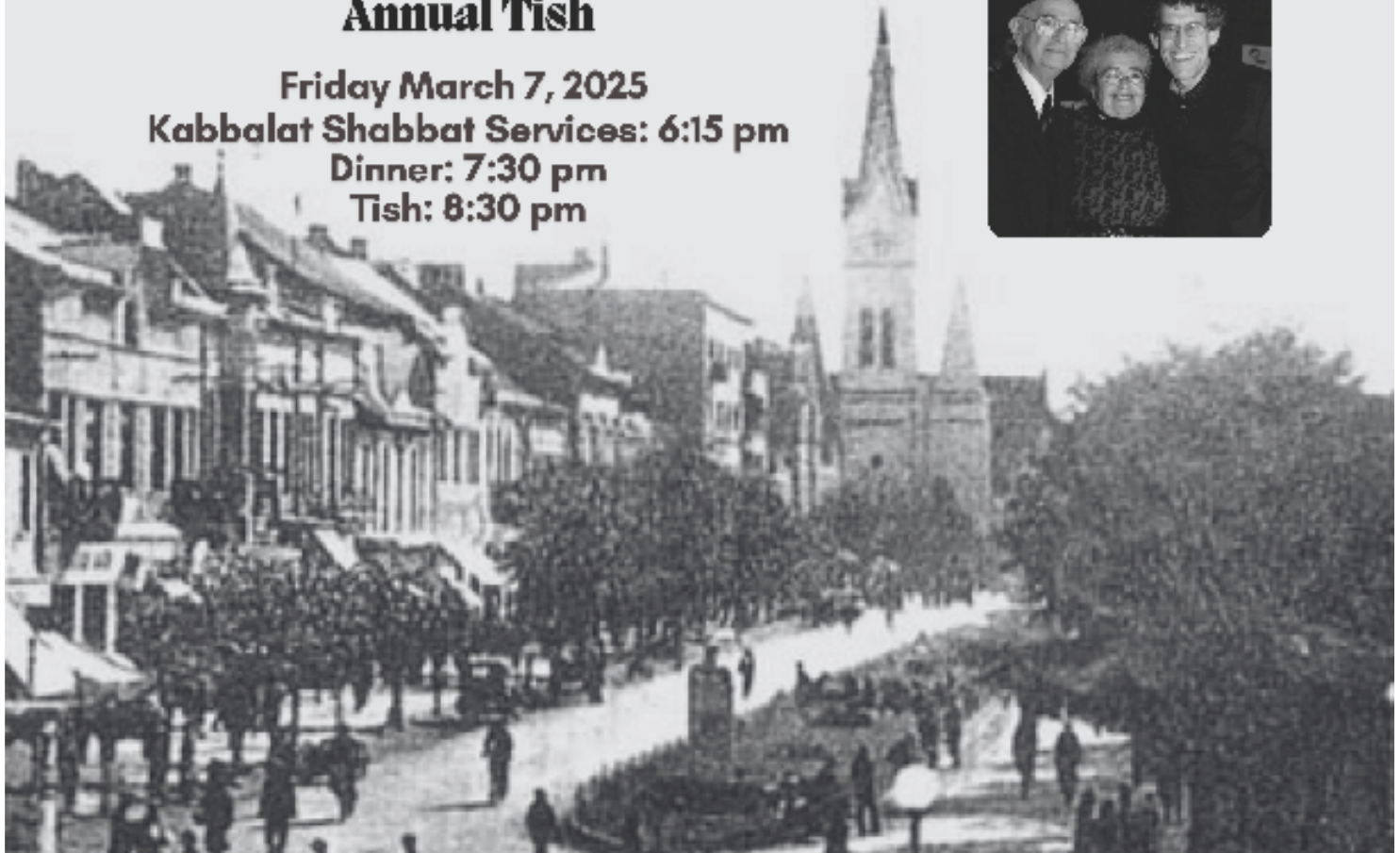

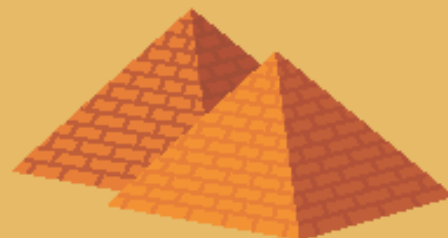

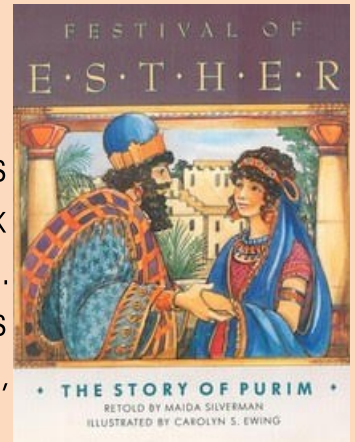

Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
