Shalom!

We recently celebrated Maris White becoming bat mitzvah on May 17. It brought our community tremendous joy to hear her perspective on Torah. She chose a difficult portion and brought it to life by understanding what motivated the characters and sharing lessons for today on how to raise children. I am so grateful for her perspective on this portion. It reminded me how we need all our perspectives on Torah to unearth the wisdom contained within it for our world. If you or someone you know would like to become bar or bat mitzvah (regardless of your age!),

do let me know!

Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berditchev notes that the final tally of the Israelites in our first Torah portion of this month, Bamidbar, comes to 603,550, which is also according to his count the number of letters in the Torah. This suggests that each of us form the Torah into the story of our people and our wisdom for the world. We each contribute an integral part of it. As the Etz Chaim Torah commentary notes, just as the absence of one letter renders a Torah scroll invalid, so too does the loss of one Jewish person make our people's work (Continued on page 2)

incomplete. Each of us are essential.

That is why I am thrilled that Scott Tepper, Violet Radnofsky, and Carl Weinstein will share unique perspectives on Torah this Shavuot on Sunday evening June 1, 7-9 PM at TBI. Each of their teachings- on the experience of Holocaust survivors, on the songs nature sings, and on Kaballah- form the wisdom of our people. I hope you will join me in learning with and from them!

Later this month we will enjoy Cantor Band's presentation of sound art, a Torah (literally, wisdom or teaching) on the value of listening we recall every day in the Shema as we heed Moses' call to us to listen.

I am excited to share that this month we will begin praying with Siddur Lev Shalem on Shabbat mornings. This newest Shabbat prayerbook of the Conservative movement offers prayers in updated designs with accessible and egalitarian language that reflects our values. It also includes thoughtful commentaries that add meaning and relevance to our prayers. I encourage you to explore our new prayerbook and the many perspectives they offer on Torah beginning Saturday May 31!

Lastly, we continue to mourn Yaron Lischinsky and Sarah Milgrim, who were murdered outside the Capital Jewish Museum last week. This young couple were an integral part of our people's story; the Torah we celebrate on Shavuot will be missing their passion and dedication to Israel, the Jewish people, and peace. May their memories inspire our work for Israel, for our people, and for a world more whole this holiday.



TBI Bookshelf

This month I'm asking for your help in finding new homes for copies of the Hertz Pentateuch and Haftorahs that we used to use for our Saturday morning services, also the newer Sim Shaloms for Shabbat and Festivals that we received from other temples but have decided not to adopt. Would you like a copy for yourself or someone you know? Please let me know! Andrea will also be asking other temple administrators if they are interested, and Rabbi Ben will be asking his connections as well. We will keep a few copies of the Hertz for ourselves, but any other books that we cannot find a new home for will be sent to the Genizah run by the Jewish Cemetery Association of Massachusetts, to await burial. You can also help us offset the cost for this—\$18 per box—with a donation to the temple. Thank you for your help!



Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in

Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
