Chodesh Tov (may you have a good month)!

As I write we enter the new Hebrew month of Tammuz. Tammuz marks the change in seasons to summer, and with it, the change in focus to the losses of that which is dear to us.

On 17 Tammuz (July 13) we relive when the Roman army broke through the walls of Jerusalem. And three weeks later, on Tisha B'av, the 9th of Av (August 3), we relive the Temple's destruction and the loss of Jewish communal life in Jerusalem, as well as countless tragedies such as murders during the Crusades, the expulsion from Spain, and the liquidation of the Warsaw Ghetto.

This year there have been many losses. The still-raw death of hundreds on October 7, young soldiers' lives cut short in war, deaths from Iranian missiles. The destruction of kibbutzim and apartment buildings, the loss of homes, the burning of trees and vegetation in Israel's north, the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. The murders of Sarah Milgrim and Yaron Lischinsky and violent attacks on others. Feelings of insecurity amidst rising antisemitism, political violence, and erosion of norms. The loss of feeling at home.

The Jewish response to loss is to come together. After a death, we surround the mourner at the funeral, at shiva, and

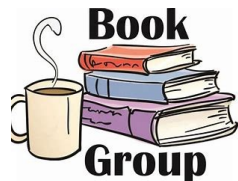

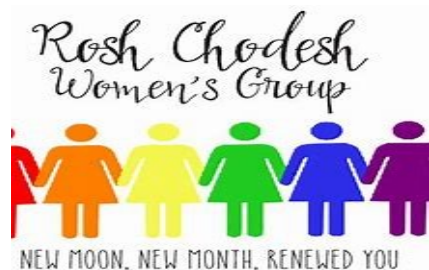
Book Book Group

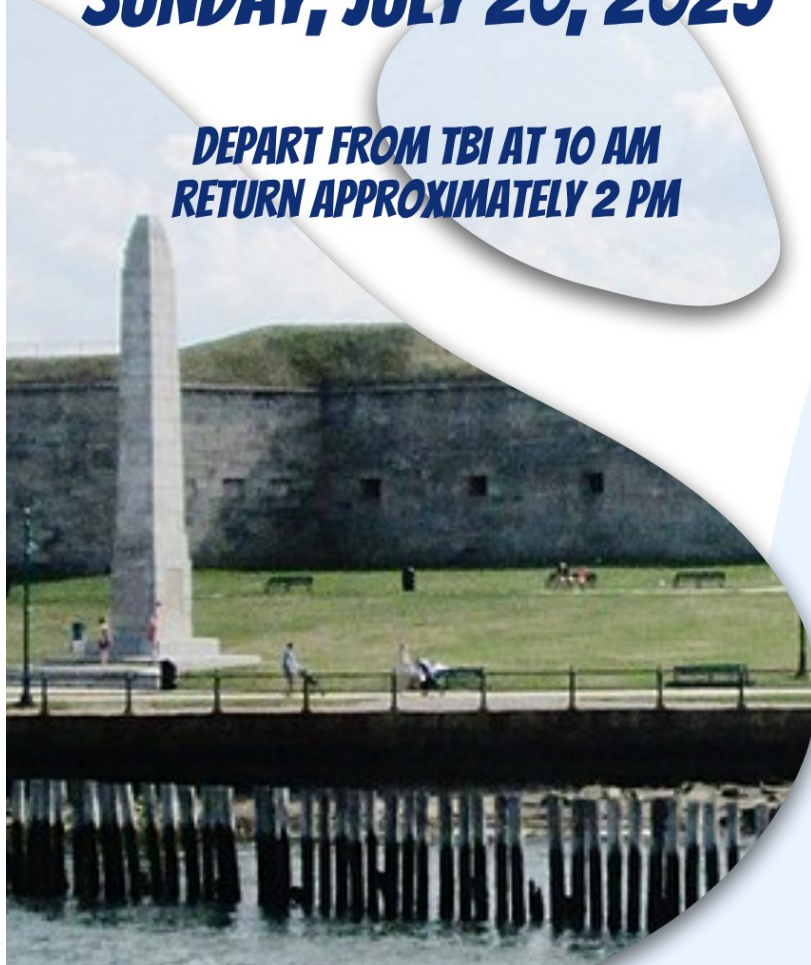

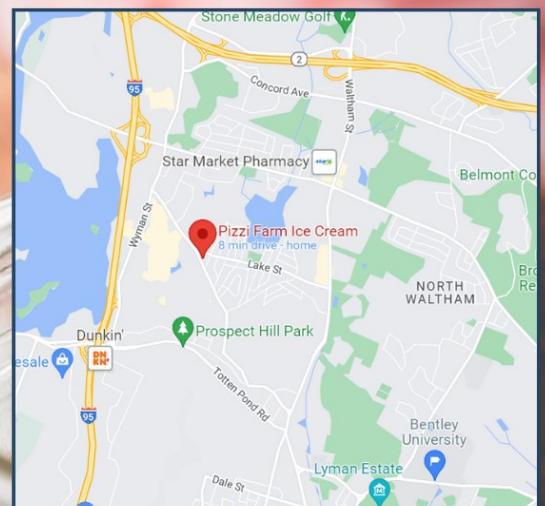

TBI Bookshelf

Thank you to Dana Fine for donating several books to our library, and for checking with me first, as we have very limited space! One of these donations was a copy of *Burning Lights* by Bella Chagall, the wife of artist Marc Chagall. Bella was a talented author and actress, and in this memoir, written while she and her husband were living in France in the 1930s, she recalls her childhood in Vitebsk, the market town where she and Marc Chagall grew up, with warmth and humor. Bella was the youngest of seven children, born into an upper middle class Hasidic family. The story of her life in pre-Revolutionary Russia is illustrated with thirty-six pen and ink drawings by her husband. The title that the Chagalls chose for this book commemorating their native town alludes to the festive candles that illuminated the Jewish year.



Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-

members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
