

PRESERVING BOOKS LOOTED BY THE NAZIS

These Books Speak Volumes is a fascinating story about how thousands of books looted by the Nazis made their way to Brandeis University. The story begins in the 1930s when the Nazis systematically plundered volumes from the private, community, and scholarly libraries of Jews in Western and Eastern Europe.



Brandeis University librarian Lou Hartman will share how she and her colleagues identified and catalogued these books, many marked with Nazi stamps, to preserve their histories and honor the memory of those who once owned them. TBI Bookshelf

In September and October, we will celebrate Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. As we think about the year that has passed, and the one to come, an important part of our tradition asks that we reflect on ways that we may have hurt others and seek forgiveness. In *Finding Forgiveness*, a children's picture book by Rebecca Garden Levington, beautifully illustrated by Diana Mayo, two young sisters have had an argument. They have been to the river for Tashlich and thrown their sins away. The older sister, wise for her years, hopes she'll be forgiven. "Still," she thinks, "my heart will not forget. I can't undo my actions or make them disappear, and so, I must forgive *myself*—and start fresh this year.... There's one last thing to do now. The most important thing." I bet you can guess what that is. *Finding Forgiveness* is a charming book for children—and adults! — with a simple but important message.



Temple Beth Israel Memorial Park

Temple Beth Israel has maintained a cemetery for its members since 1951. Beth Israel Memorial Park is located on South Street, between the Stanley Elementary School and Children's Hospital. Graves are available in Section A (the right side as you enter the cemetery), Section B (the left side as you enter the cemetery) and in Kulanu (the left side, after Section B). The cost to purchase an individual grave in Sections A or B for Temple members is \$2,200 (\$4,400 for two). The cost for non-

members is \$3,600 per grave, which includes one year of membership.

You must be a Temple member for two or more consecutive years to take advantage of Member pricing; Non-member pricing applies to all others.

Kulanu is dedicated to serving the needs of Jewish Temple members who are married to a non-Jewish spouse. Graves in the Kulanu interfaith section are sold in lots of two, at a total cost of \$4,400 for members. The cost for non-members is \$7,200 for a lot of two, which includes one year of family membership.
